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INTRODUCTION

Outlining is designed to help students develop an understanding of what outlines are, the structure of an outline, and the purpose of each component. The book also illustrates the value of using outlines as a study aid and a systematic way to organize material.

The activity pages lead students, step-by-step, through the outlining process, providing lots of practice with each new concept. They examine prepared outlines, complete partial outlines, and create their own outlines from information provided.

Students also are asked to compose single paragraphs and longer reports from given, outlined notes.


Upon completion of *Outlining*, students should be able to:

- Identify the parts of an outline
- Use accurate outline form and punctuation
- Complete an outline of multiple-paragraph length
- Compose a short report based on a given outline
- Name at least three uses of an outline

The reproducible pages in this book allow teachers the flexibility of meeting student needs for extra practice or advancing as skills are mastered. *Outlining* may be used as a teaching unit in itself or as a supplement to enrich or remediate the standard curriculum coverage of this material.

The last page may be used as a small poster. It shows students the basic structure and punctuation of outlines. You may find it helpful to post this page for ready reference as they work to improve their outlining skills.

Outlining



A SKELETON supports a person or thing.

An OUTLINE supports a written or oral project.

A SKELETON is the "bare bones" of a person or thing.

An OUTLINE is the "bare bones" of a written or oral project.

What is an outline?

An outline is a way to organize ideas or facts in a logical order.

It is a plan for writing, telling, or doing something.

An outline includes only main ideas and important details.

Why do you make outlines?

Making an outline will save you time and make your project easier and better.

To make an outline, you group ideas or facts together. As you group them, you will be able to:

- Organize your information by topic.
- Include all the important information.
- Leave out any information that doesn't fit.
- Plan your project in a logical way.

What are the parts of an outline?

An outline may have 4 parts:

Title:

Food from Plants

The TITLE tells you what the outline is about.

Main Topic:

Food from Plants

I. Fruits

II. Vegetables

III. Grains

The MAIN TOPICS tell the main idea of EACH paragraph you plan to write or tell about.



A Roman numeral (I, II, III) goes before each main topic.

A period follows each Roman numeral.

A main topic always begins with a capital letter.


