
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INTRODUCTION

The cloze procedure is incorporated into this unit as a springboard for comprehension. When students complete a cloze passage and have the opportunity to discuss their responses, more significant growth in the comprehension takes place. The students not only gain a greater understanding of concepts, but they expand their vocabulary, as well. This unit uses the cloze procedure for comprehension and it includes a series of questions for discussion of each selection. This added feature insures that the student has a broad understanding of the story by incorporating thinking skills as well as recall activities. The questions involve inference, prediction, and relationship.

The words in this passage have not been deleted at random. Care was taken to include all of the parts of speech and an effort was made to avoid deletions that would confuse the student. For deletions within each passage, answers are selected from the words in the box. This procedure eliminates the frustration that many students encounter because they are more likely to experience success.

The stories featured in this unit have unusual content, which should make them highly interesting to students. The selections are presented in gradually increasing length and difficulty. When students are gradually exposed to more challenging material, their reading skills generally grow.

The cloze format is equally valid for testing. The selections may also be used to assess the student's readability level.

Suggestions: After students complete Cloze Reading, a second reading before answering questions is recommended.


