Unit Overview

The **Sports** unit is intended to be used during the first few months of Grade One, when children are starting to develop their reading and writing skills. This unit focuses on having the children write complete sentences, brainstorm, rhyme, put words into alphabetical order, and use their phonetic knowledge to decode words.

A display of books about sports set up in the classroom motivates children and encourages them to read for enjoyment and information. Children read these books in their spare time and during silent reading.

Spelling

The spelling lessons follow a set sequence of five activities as follows:

Day One

Children print each of their spelling words three to five times in their spelling notebooks.

Day Two

Children print a complete sentence for each of their spelling words in their spelling notebooks.

Day Three

Children work with a partner to practice their spelling words. They can use individual white boards or slates to practice their spelling words.

Day Four

Test the children on their spelling words. Those children who get 100% on the test do not need to rewrite the spelling test on day five.

Day Five

Retest the children who did not get 100% on their spelling test on day four.
