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#### INTRODUCTION

This book includes twenty-five intriguing stories sure to interest young readers. Following each story is a follow-up activity which requires the student to decide the validity of statements about specific details, then find and write the sentences which support their decisions. Correct responses result in the spelling of a word related to the topic that is then looked up in a dictionary. This added exercise encourages the use of a resource book and is also an excellent vocabulary enrichment activity.

**Reading for Details** is an effective teaching tool for many ages and ability levels. It is one of a two-book series that is suitable for use in grades 4-8. This book is written at the 4th-grade reading level. Included is an answer key.

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### **Beware the Black Rose**
