

BETSY ROSS (1752-1836)



On January I, 1752, Betsy Ross was born in Philadelphia. There are people who have said that it was she who made the first United States flag. There are also people who have said she didn't. There is no way of knowing if the story is true.

What we do know is that there was a Betsy Ross. She was a seamstress who made flags in Philadelphia during the American Revolutionary War. What we don't know is whether she did indeed make the first United States flag.

Not everyone believed the story of Betsy Ross and the flag. The story was not told for almost 100 years after the event was supposed to have happened.


In 1870, William Canby, Betsy's grandson, wrote a paper about his grandmother. He said she told him the story about how she had made the first United States flag.

Canby said a group of men, including George Washington, visited the home of his grandmother in June of 1776. They asked her to make a flag from a plan that they gave to her.

Washington, the leader of the army of the colonies, understood how important it was for the 13 colonies to fight under one flag rather than to fight under 13 different flags. Washington knew that one flag would unite the colonies into one nation. The first flag of the United States symbolized this unity. It had 7 red stripes alternating with 6 white stripes. In the upper left-hand corner was a blue square with a circle of 13 white stars on it. As more states were added to the United States over the years, more stars were added to the flag. Today's flag has 50 stars on it for the 50 united states.

Betsy Ross died in 1836 at the age of 84.
