

It's a Small World

(TRISTAN DA CUNHA, 1998) The Internet is making the world a smaller place. This year the Internet came to Tristan da Cunha. This is an island in the South Atlantic. It is where people live farther away from anywhere else in the world.

The island is 1,449 miles from its nearest neighbor. The island is just 38 square miles in size. A little less than 300 people live on Tristan da Cunha. They all live in one town called Edinburgh.

The island has no airport and no hotel. It does have a library, a weekly dance, a pub, a cafe, and a cricket field. It

also has a golf course. Golfers share this space with grazing cows. Most people on the island make their living by crayfishing. Mail and supplies are brought to the island six times a year by fishing boats. It can get pretty lonely on Tristan da Cunha.

In January of 1998, Tristan da Cunha hooked up to the Internet. Now they can send and get E-mail. Before this, if someone sent a letter to a friend, it might take six months to get a letter back by ship. The people on the island called it "snail mail."

The island has only one computer terminal. Everyone



who lives there can use it. But the people of Tristan da Cunha will not be "surfing the 'Net." Their cost to link up with the Internet is \$5.00 or more a minute.



Raising the Titanic

(LOS ANGELES, 1997) — On April 14, 1912, the Titanic hit an iceberg and sank to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean. More than 1,500 passengers on board the huge ship died. The ship probably will always remain at the bottom of the ocean. Yet, all these years later, the famous ship has become even more famous.

Over the past year, people in the United States alone have spent more than \$400 million on tickets and videos of the movie *Titanic*. The movie starred Leonardo DiCaprio and Kate Winslet. It



won many Academy Awards. It is now the country's third highest money-making film ever. Only *Star Wars* and *E.T.* have made more money. It is believed that *Titanic* will pass both these movies to

take the number one spot.

The movie has created worldwide interest in the ship. Just about anything still remaining from the doomed ship has value. When the ship hit the iceberg, the crew sent urgent messages for help. In 1998, a collector paid \$123,500 for a set of 34 of these messages.

Some people think the Titanic should be raised from the bottom of the ocean. Others feel the ship and its tragic memories should be left alone.
