Moose On The Loose Teacher Input Suggestions

- 1. Display moose pictures, postcards, books, filmstrips, antlers... at an interest centre.
- 2. Brainstorm for words, facts, ideas your students have pertaining to moose.

Record information on a word web/fact chart...at the beginning and ending of the unit in order to do a comparison.

Keep a chart ongoing so students can add facts as discovered: appearance, home, habits, food, enemies.

Develop a chart of moose facts, ie. "Did you know?"

Prepare an oral true/false quiz using the moose facts, to determine how much your students know or have learned.


- 3. Topics for discussion:
 - hunting/extinction
 - Canadian animals
- 4. List the titles of moose books read to the class.
 - Graph the favourites.
 - Write to the authors.
 - Show moose films and videos.
- 5. Trips: Zoo-observe moose and members of deer family (elk, caribou). Museum-visit Canadian animal display.
- 6. Speakers: Invite a hunter to the classroom. Discuss hunting licences.
- 7. Mapping: Observe/discuss areas in North America where moose are found.
- 8. Visit the museum—if it has a Canadian Animal display.

Plan with the librarian and develop special activities: research, mini projects...

Plan a "Moose Party" to conclude the theme and present activity results.

Although not all students require word study/phonics activities, these activities can be assigned to students who are having difficulty with a specific concept, or need more practice with a skill, e.g., spelling, word recognition, plurals.

Mount and laminate the phonics/word study activities to keep in a file folder, box or binder.




