



Little Buddies Picture Clues & Phonics Fun Chart

Little Buddies like to have fun doing activities on their own—just like your own child—so look for these helpful picture clues in the activity directions.



All six Little Buddies characters in this workbook—Rabbit, Sally and Sammy, Tiger, Vinny, Will, and Little Zebra—appear on collector's cards on the back side of the Little Buddies Phonics Fun Chart at the back of this book.



Look for the Little Buddies and their corresponding letter-sound pictures tucked into activities for each Little Buddies story. Have your child color, cut out, and glue the pictures to the inside of the chart to match with the characters on the back side. The Little Buddies Phonics Fun Chart can be used as a bookmark while your child enjoys the activities, or it can be cut apart to create personalized Little Buddies collector's cards—collect all 36 cards in the Little Buddies Phonics Fun series!

Little Buddies Phonics Tips for BIG Reading Results

Phonics is one of the five essential steps that children must master in order to read. Practicing these five steps helps children learn to be good readers.

Phonemic awareness. This is the ability to recognize that spoken words are made up of many different individual sounds. For example, young learners need to hear the beginning, middle, and ending sounds when someone says cat.

Phonics. This is the ability to recognize that letters—and certain groups of letters—appearing in printed words represent different sounds. Children who have been taught phonics can accurately recognize familiar words automatically and can "decode," or figure out, new words.

Here are some tips for practicing phonics and promoting reading success at home.

- Talk with your child all the time about subjects that he or she finds interesting.
- Sing songs, recite rhymes and poems with repeating phrases, tell riddles and knock-knock jokes, and share stories that you enjoyed as a child.
- Make up stories while traveling in the car. Start with a silly beginning sentence, such as "Once upon a time, there was a skunk in our bathtub." Take turns adding new sentences aloud.
- Have your child describe a favorite story character, family relative, birthday present, or costume.
- Notice and talk about road signs, menus, and advertisements with your child when traveling.
 When at the grocery store, have your child read the letters and words on boxes and cans.

- Reading fluency. This is the ability to quickly and accurately decode a passage of words for meaning. Readers who are weak in fluency read slowly, word by word, focusing on decoding words instead of automatically recognizing them and understanding what they mean.
- Vocabulary development. At this step, children actively build and expand their knowledge of the meanings and pronunciations of new words—both written and spoken.
- Reading comprehension. This is the step when children become purposeful, active readers by acquiring strategies to understand, remember, and communicate what has been read.
- Keep a wide variety of books, newspapers, and children's magazines at home, and carry reading material with you whenever you have free time, such as while waiting at the doctor's office.
 Let your child see you read often for your own benefit so your child realizes that reading is important and enjoyable.
- Establish a reading time, such as after dinner or before bed, to help your child get into the habit of reading every day. Make reading time a warm, pleasant experience. Sit close to your child, snuggle, laugh, and have fun. As you read aloud, ask your child about the pictures in the story, the characters, and what he or she thinks will happen next. Read aloud with expression. Use different voices for the different characters and add sound effects to the story.
- Visit the library often with your child. Take advantage of library story times, and pick out books together to bring home.

Meet the Little Buddies!

Each Little Buddy appears in a story that features the sound of a specific letter or cluster of letters. Meet the seven Little Buddies and their featured letter sounds in this workbook:



Rabbit is always ready to rock and roll! Rather than resting, he likes to run, row, and ride his skateboard—although never recklessly. When it's time to relax, Rabbit regularly heads right off to his room to rock in his rocking chair.



Tick-tock, tick-tock! A clock and a watch help Tiger stay on track so he knows when it is time for toast, tennis, toys, tea, and the tub. And at the end of the day, Tiger takes time to tuck in Teddy, his trusty teddy bear.

Will helps children learn the beginning sound of the letter Ww.

When Will wakes up each day, he checks the weather so he will know what to wear. Whether it's warm, windy, wet, or wintry outside, Will never worries. He has a wonderful wardrobe of clothes that work well for all types of weather.

Sally and Sammy

help children learn the beginning sound of the letter **Ss**.

Summer is Sally and Sammy's favorite season. These sweet small squirrels simply love to start the day playing in the sun. Sometimes they scamper to the park to play on the seesaw. Sometimes they skip to the backyard to sit in trees and play in the sandbox. And sometimes they scoot over to the sea to sail ground in their sailboat.

Vinny helps children learn the beginning sound of the letter **Vv**.


Vinny is a vole, which is visibly very similar to a mouse. Vinny values his book of vocabulary words that begin with the letter **V**. When you view "Vinny's Book of **V**, Volume 1," you will see a vast collection of various things, such as vegetables, a violin, a volcano, and a van.


Little Zebra helps children learn the beginning sound of the letter **Zz**.




Little Buddies Phonics Fun Story Words
